Activity Ideas for Easter: Year 4



- 1. Create a <u>tally chart</u> for recording the birds who visit your garden. (Visit the RSPB website for help with identifying them and ideas for encouraging them to visit).
- 2. Make Easter themed <u>story stones</u> and use them to tell stories to each other.
- 3. Create <u>small words</u> using natural spring materials found in your gardens / when out walking.
- 4. Do some <u>egg experiments</u> (those pictured were found at science-sparks.com).
- 5. Make <u>paper mache</u> Easter eggs or hot air balloons (theimaginationtree.com).
- 6. Use celery sticks to create <u>rose paintings</u> (theimaginationtree.com).
- 7. Make some <u>marbled paper</u> using shaving foam (theartfulparent.com).
- 8. Make an egg sun-catcher using blossom petals (theartfulparent.com).
- 9. Create and complete a scavenger hunt.
- 10. Make <u>life-cycle wheels</u> for wildlife/plant-life found in your area.
- 11. Get the kids to make you an <u>Easter treasure hunt</u> with clues (they could make things for you to find or perhaps could bake some buns/biscuits and hide those).
- 12. Get the children to draw a detailed <u>plan</u> of the house/garden and mark on their plan where you have hidden something for them to find (this could be an Easter treat / 'voucher' for an activity of their choice / a letter you have written to them).
